



Principal Faculty Stanford School of Medicine, Office of Physician Assistant Studies

The Stanford School of Medicine is seeking two Principal Faculty positions to support the Master of Science in Physician Assistant Studies program. These two positions report to the Program Director and are non-tenure-track appointments at the rank of Clinical Assistant Professor or Clinical Associate Professor, commensurate with experience, education, scholarly output and other qualifications. The Principal Faculty members' primary responsibilities include teaching, coordination, student mentoring, and assessment and evaluation in alignment with the program's mission and goals. Ongoing clinical practice is expected to be one day per week.

The duties and responsibilities of this position include:

- Participate in the development, implementation and evaluation of the PA curriculum
- Participate as a lecturer/small group facilitator throughout the curriculum, teaching in areas of expertise and program need
- Teaching and coordination of student learning activities during the didactic and clinical phase of the program
- Participate in inter-professional educational experiences
- Assist in ongoing program self-assessment activities
- Advise/mentor, instruct, and evaluate PA students
- Serve on program committees as assigned by the Program Director
- Engage in scholarly activity and service to the program, college, university and community
- Represent the PA Program within the Stanford community and the statewide medical community
- Participate in national, regional and state PA professional organizations

Position Conditions/Qualifications:

The eligible candidate will be a graduate of an accredited physician assistant program, will be current in their national certification from the National Commission on the Certification of Physician Assistants (NCCPA) and will be eligible for California licensure. A master's degree in a healthcare-related course of study is required; a doctoral degree is preferred. A minimum of five years of clinical practice as a PA, along with a record of successful teaching and scholarly output, is also required.
