



Pulmonary, Allergy, and Critical Care Medicine – Clinical Assistant Professor

The Division of Pulmonary, Allergy, and Critical Care Medicine (PACCM) in the Department of Medicine at Stanford University School of Medicine is actively recruiting **an outstanding Pulmonary and Critical Care specialist** to join our team of leading physicians in an academic medical setting that focuses on excellence in clinical care, teaching, and research.

As a member of the Clinician Educator line (Clinical Assistant Professor), the faculty combines clinical practice skills with teaching and scholarly pursuits tailored to academic interests. The ideal candidate harbors comprehensive skills in general pulmonary medicine and critical care medicine, as well as an interest in taking an active role in the education of PACCM fellows, medicine residents, and medical students.

Outpatient responsibilities include general pulmonary clinical practice at Stanford Health Care (SHC) main campus (Palo Alto) or in East Bay (Emeryville, CA). Referrals encompass the full spectrum of common pulmonary diagnoses with provider access to outstanding on-site diagnostics (e.g. state-of-the-art CT chests, ventilation-perfusion scans, pulmonary function testing, and cardiopulmonary exercise testing), nationally-renowned subspecialty expert teams (e.g. interstitial lung disease, chest radiology, pulmonary hypertension, asthma, interventional pulmonology, and lung transplant), and recurrent multi-disciplinary and grand rounds conferences.

Inpatient critical care practice is located in an SHC-affiliated community setting. The medical and surgical ICU (Intensive Care Unit) is closed, and the faculty work closely with other PACCM and surgical physicians, including rotating trainees. Competence and interest in the care of post-operative patients in cardiac surgery, interventional cardiology, vascular surgery, and thoracic surgery are essential. The faculty is also expected to attend overnight and swing shifts to support 24 hr coverage of critical care units.

The inpatient pulmonary consult service at SHC-Palo Alto provides the unique interface between general pulmonary medicine and several other tertiary care services (e.g. bone marrow transplantation) with highly specific pulmonary problems and needs. Procedures include bronchoscopy, thoracentesis, and pulmonary function test interpretation.

Teaching responsibilities include direct oversight of the PACCM core fellows and rotating residents (e.g. internal medicine and anesthesia) on the pulmonary consult service and staffing of the PACCM fellows' clinic. Moreover, faculty will teach general pulmonary and critical care medicine topics at the internal medicine residency noon lecture series as well as help revamp the pulmonary consult rotation teaching curriculum. Finally, faculty will mentor 1-2 fellows per year on the Clinician Educator fellowship pathway and serve as the liaison to the Stanford medical student ambulatory block mentorship rotation.

The Division of PACCM is a highly collegial and supportive group of physicians, advanced practice providers, and staff. A faculty position within the division allows for flexibility in work hours; excellent short-, intermediate-, and long-term benefits packages; and direct access to the beautiful campus and resources associated with the internationally renowned Stanford University.

Salary and rank are commensurate with experience. The start date is September 2023 and is negotiable; the position will remain open until filled.

The expected base pay range for this position is:

Applicants will have demonstrated outstanding qualifications in education, academics, and clinical care. Rank will be commensurate with experience and salary is competitive and based on years of experience in rank. All Clinician Educators in the Division are eligible to participate in an excellent incentive program as part of their total compensation package. There are additional opportunities for pay if so desired by new faculty.

All candidates must be Board Certified in both pulmonary medicine and critical care medicine. Final applicants must possess a California medical license at the time of the appointment.
